Crossing a New Bridge



Billingsgate's two Common Councilmen, Deputy Jamie Ingham Clark and John Petrie, were elected to the Bridge House Estates (BHE) Board, the newly created board responsible for governing the City of London's five bridges and the substantial charitable trust connected to them. Created by a Royal Charter granted by King Edward I in 1282, BHE has since that time constructed and maintained the vital river crossings between the City and Southwark; in the 19th century they were responsible for the construction of Tower Bridge, one of the most famous landmarks in the world. In addition to the latter, BHE now owns and maintains London, Southwark, Blackfriars and the Millennium Bridges. With the City of London as sole trustee, Jamie and John are now two of the

ten representatives of the City responsible for overseeing the body, as is fitting for Billingsgate as a Thames-side ward.

With a substantial endowment built up through tolls on both foot and water traffic, rents and investment, BHE has been able to maintain these crucial access routes to and from the City without government funding. It is now the 7th largest charitable trust in the UK. Overseeing a comprehensive maintenance programme, BHE works with other bodies across the City, including the City of London Police and the City Corporation, to provide security for the millions of annual commuters

COVID-19 Booster and Flu Vaccines



The number of cases of COVID-19 in London is rising. But the COVID-19 booster programme can make a real difference. Boosters are available to those 50 years old or older, people who work in health or social care or younger people who have a long-term health condition. The jab boosts waning immunity for those most at risk over the winter period. More than eight million people in the UK have already received their COVID-19 booster vaccine. People will be invited by the NHS when it's their turn. If you have not been contacted within a week of reaching six months since your second vaccine you can call 119 or book online or visit various walk-in sites across London.

Flu is another virus that can be serious. To give people the best

protection over winter, those over 50 years old, and people who have a long-term health condition or are pregnant are eligible for a free flu vaccine and should book an appointment at either their GP practice or their local pharmacy.

The offer of a first and second COVID-19 vaccine remains open to anyone who is eligible, including children aged 12 to 15 years old.

Some of the new variants of concern spread more quickly. This means it is even more important to get both doses of the vaccine or just one dose for those aged between 12 and 17 years old.

Free cycle services on offer



The City of London Corporation is calling on residents and workers to take advantage of free cycle services as the Square Mile's buzz returns.

Throughout the pandemic, many people across England took to two wheels as the benefits of fresh air and sustainable travel became even more evident during the months of lockdown.

TfL revealed that cycling levels during the coronavirus pandemic were boosted from 21 per cent of Londoners in 2019/20 to 27 per cent in 2020/21.

Those who live, work or study in the City of London are eligible to receive free cycle training from expert instructors who will tailor the session to the rider's ability – from first-time riders to regular cyclists looking to improve confidence.

Since August last year, a total of 218 adult cycle skills sessions have been undertaken by Pedal Me and Cycle Confident in the City of London. In addition, two Square Mile schools have benefited from school cycle training sessions.

Meet your candidates

By the time you receive this newsletter the deadline for registering to vote in next year's City elections will almost be due – 16 December.

If you are registered you will be able to vote for the City's Common Councillors in March 2022. These elections are held by 'first past the post' and you will have the same number of votes as councillors you are electing, eg three votes in a three-member ward. If there is a vacancy for an Alderman in your ward next year, you will also have one vote in that election.

You will also be invited to attend your ward's Wardmote, a meeting similar to a hustings, the day before the election, 23 March 2022. This will give you the opportunity to meet your candidates and ask them questions. You will be able to vote in your allocated polling station on polling day, 24 March 2022. As with any other election, you can request a postal vote without needing a reason. If you think you might be away from the City or busy on Election Day, you might want to arrange a postal vote that goes to your home or work address. Postal votes are usually dispatched 10 working days before polling day.

Updated information on the wardmotes, their timing and location will appear on the website.

Invitations to the meetings will also be sent to all electors.

ASK FOR ANGELA

By telling customers that they can 'Ask for Angela' we're giving them a discreet code word that they can give to staff if they feel unsafe or threatened.

The City of London Police, City of London Corporation and Metropolitan Police Service are working in partnership with Safer Sounds, who are part of the Safer Business Network, and licensed venues to help keep people safe while in the City of London.

The 'Ask for Angela' initiative is being rolled out to bars, clubs and other licensed businesses across the whole of London, including in the City of London. The scheme aims to reduce sexual violence and vulnerability by providing customers with a phrase they can use to get the attention of staff if they feel unsafe or uncomfortable. Staff can help by reuniting them with a friend, seeing them to a taxi, or by calling venue security and/or the police.

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Many of the City's bars, clubs and other licensed businesses are getting busier and will continue to do so in the lead up to Christmas. For many people, this could be the first time they have been to a licensed premises during the festive period in two years, due to the pandemic.

and residents, and to promote the City as a centre for business and tourism.

For the last twenty-five years BHE through the City Bridge Trust has made use of its surplus income to support good causes, donating around £25 million a year to charities across Greater London.

The new Board was set up to reform and improve BHE's governance and ensure that its activities support and deliver on its primary and ancillary objects. The ten members, including Jamie and John, will ensure that BHE's operation of the five bridges is efficient and that its work delivers value for money and help support London's communities as the capital continues recovers from the Covid-19 pandemic.



The Bridge Mark has been used by the Bridge House Estates as its distinctive emblem since the 17th century and can be found on several of the five City of London bridges and on the many buildings in and around the City which make up the Bridge House Estate.
