Overview

This policy provides financial assistance towards the cost of school clothing and footwear for families on low income living in the City of London (City).

The grant will be available once every academic year to low-income families who have children attending a maintained primary or secondary school (Reception to Year 11).

Applicants must meet **all** the criteria listed below to be eligible; eligibility criteria for the grant are as follows:

1) Agreed School Uniform

The pupil's school must have an agreed school uniform or agreed Physical Education (P.E) Kit that is part of the school's dress code.

2) Residence

Both the applicant and child must be residents of the City at the time of application to be eligible. This includes foster carers of City Looked After Children living temporarily outside the City¹. Proof of residence should be provided at the time of application.

3) Low-income assessment

3.1 The family must be entitled to Targeted Free School Meals and be in receipt of one of the following Department for Education's (DfE) qualifying means-tested benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Universal Credit, where annual earned household income is £7,400 or less (after tax and excluding benefits)
- Eligible families with No Recourse to Public Funds (NRPF), where they meet the relevant eligibility criteria for Targeted Free School Meals.

3.2 The qualifying benefits listed in section 3.1 will automatically reflect any changes made by the to the DfE's eligibility criteria for Targeted Free School Meals.

4) Proof of school attendance

¹ Section 20 agreement of the Children Act 1989. Approval from the Head of Service for Children's Social Care and Early Help must be sought for any child or young person being considered for a grant under Section 20 of the Children Act 1989.

The applicant must submit a letter from the school confirming child details and start date.

5) When can the clothing grant be claimed?

5.1 The application process will start from May to July each year and payment will be made during August, in time for the start of the new academic year.

5.2 Children and young people must be attending a maintained school from Reception to Year 11 in the new academic year.

5.3 Late applications may result in the application not being processed.

5.4 Applicants applying for places in-year must apply for the grant within two months of receiving a school offer.

6) Funding Amounts

6.1 If a school does not have an agreed school uniform or P.E. Kit, then funding will not be available.

6.2 Eligible claimants whose children will be attending a primary school that has an agreed school uniform will receive a payment of £60.

6.3 Eligible claimants whose children will be attending a secondary school that has an agreed school uniform will receive a payment of £160.

6.4 If a primary or secondary school does not have an agreed school uniform but has a P.E. kit as part of the school's dress code, then eligible claimants will receive a one-off payment to the value of a standard P.E. kit.

7) Proof of benefit

Applicant details will be checked against the Department for Education's Eligibility Checking System. If the applicant is receiving one of the qualifying benefits their details will be matched on the database. If their details do not match the database, this means that they may not be entitled to free school meals, therefore not entitled to clothing grants.

8) Re-assessing eligibility

The City will re-assess eligibility if the applicant disagrees with the outcome of the eligibility checking system;

8.1 If in receipt of Child Tax Credit, the applicant must provide a copy of their latest HMRC Tax Credit award notification; or

8.2 If in receipt of any other qualifying benefit, the applicant must provide a letter (no more than three months old) from the benefits agency confirming

entitlement.

9) Changes to clothing grant criteria and grant amount

9.1 The budget will be reviewed each year and recommendations made to adjust the grant if required to ensure that the budget is affordable and reflects current demand

9.2 If the Department for Education changes the means tested benefits to the free school meals criteria, the means tested benefits listed in Section 3.1 will be modified to reflect the change. This means that the family must be in receipt of one of the means tested benefits listed in the new criteria

10) Appeals

Appeals must be made to the Head of Education and Early Years' Service outlining the reasons for appeal, including any supporting documentation. The Head of Service will aim to respond within 10 working days of receiving an appeal.
