

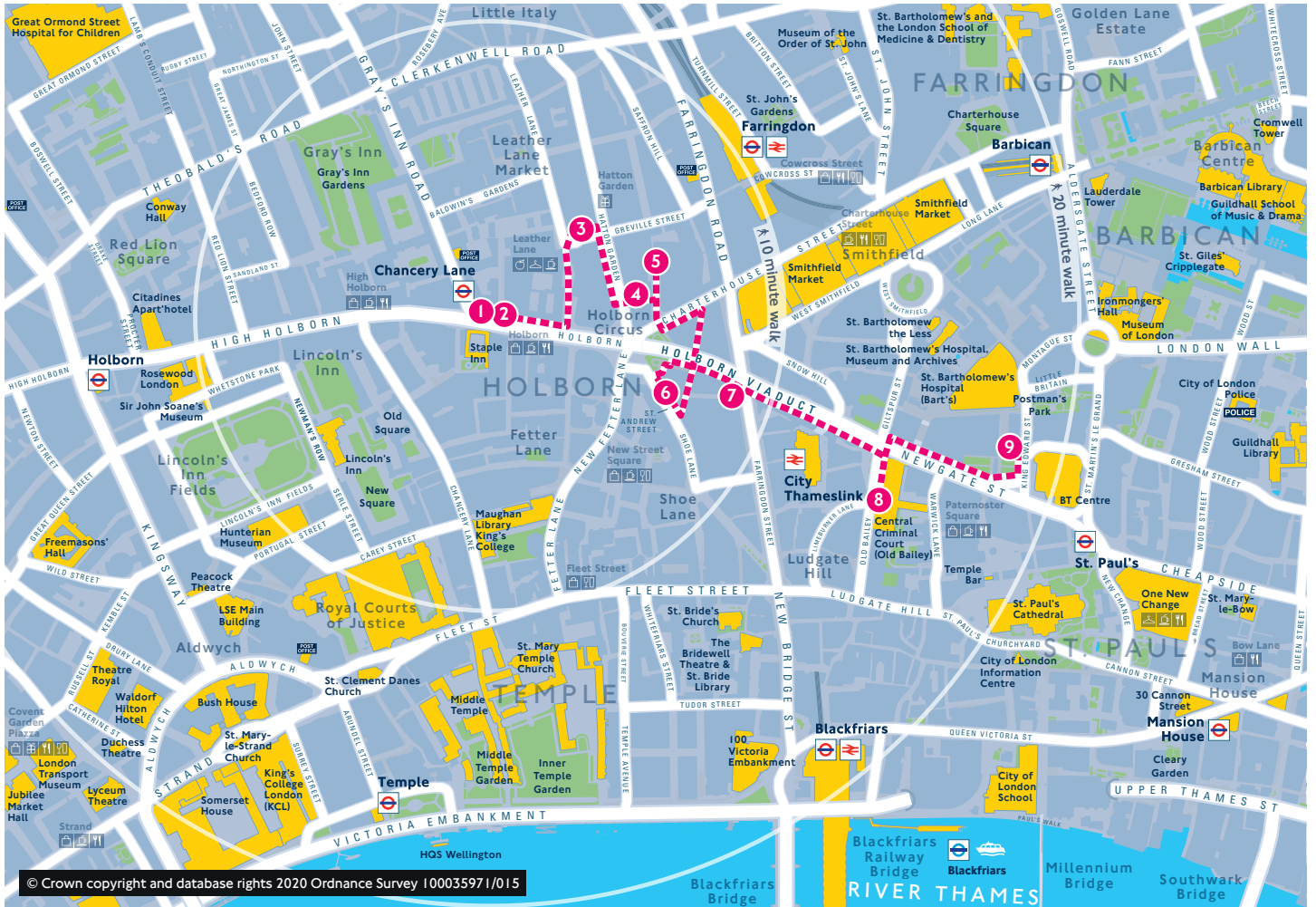
From the suburbs to the City
