

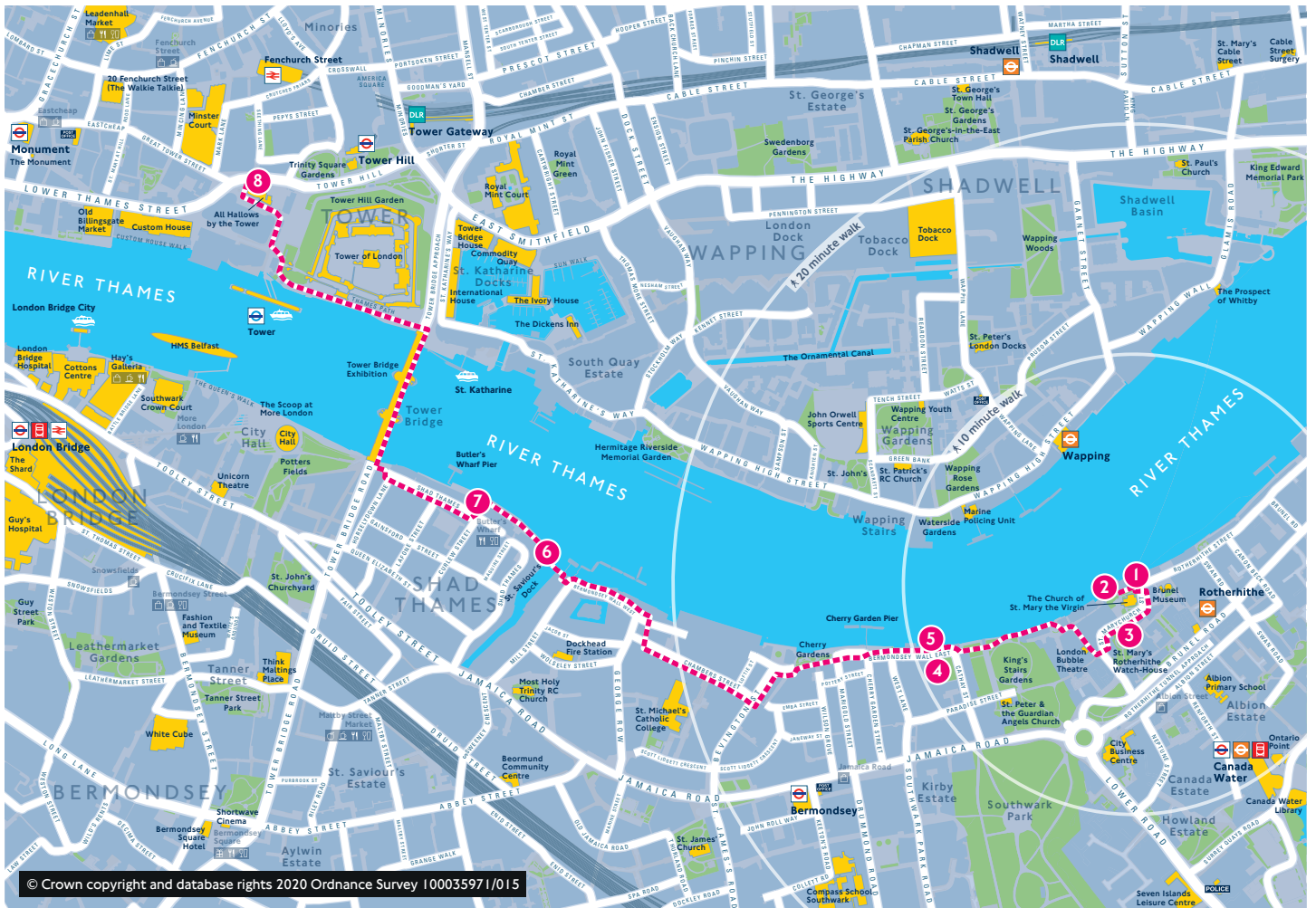
# From the suburbs to the City



Escape the crowds of your local neighbourhood and adventure close to home walking in the City of London. Take lesser-trodden paths and uncover centuries of history, art and culture along the way on these walks designed to offer safe and fun ways for you to enjoy and explore London.

When you reach the City there is plenty to explore in the ancient heart of the capital. You don't need to travel to Italy to see Roman ruins or France to experience cafe culture. Grab a coffee in Bloomberg Arcade and watch the world go by, or marvel at the remains of the Roman Amphitheatre under Guildhall Yard.

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## Southwark to the City - Go West!

Travel through the centuries between Southwark and All Hallows by the Tower

1

### Mayflower pub

Start of the walk. 18th century pub named after the Pilgrim Fathers' ship, which sailed to America in 1620

2

### St. Mary's Church

Burial site of Christopher Jones, captain of the Mayflower. Church rebuilt 1715. In the graveyard lies the tomb of Prince Lee Boo, from the Pacific Islands, who died in 1784

3

### Old Free School

Originally founded in 1613 by Peter Hills, master mariner, and Robert Bell to educate children of seafarers from the parish. Moved to this building in the 1790s. Next door is a watch house (1821) built to deter bodysnatchers!

### Edward III's Manor House

Remains of a royal residence of King Edward III - originally moated on three sides

5

### Dr Salter's Daydream

Delightful series of statues by Diane Gorvin commemorating local doctor Alfred Salter who dedicated his life to the poor

6

### St. Saviour's Dock

Where the Neckinger river flows into the Thames. Name derived it is said from the devil's neckcloth - slang for a hangman's noose

7

### Derek Jarman blue plaque

Filmmaker, artist and gay rights activist Derek Jarman (1942-1994) lived and worked here in the 1970s

### All Hallows-by-the-Tower

The oldest church in the City of London, with Roman remains in its crypt. End of the walk

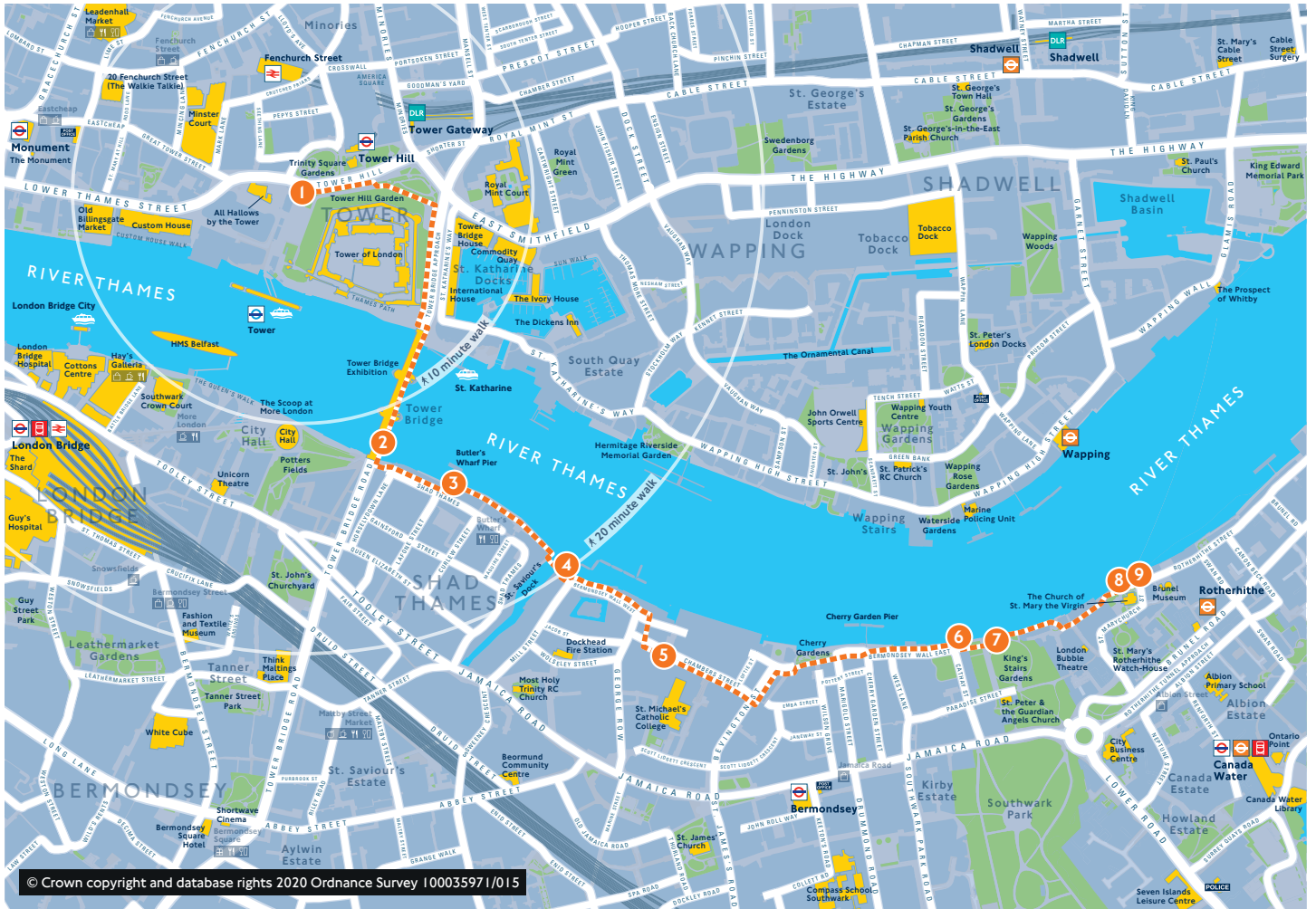
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## The City to Southwark - Go West!

Travel through the centuries between All Hallows by the Tower and Southwark

- 1** **Tower of London**  
Start of the walk. Fortress, palace, armoury, mint, observatory, zoo, place of torture and execution. Built by William I in the 11th century and expanded over the centuries
- 2** **Tower Bridge**  
Designed by Sir Horace Jones and James Wolfe Barry and opened in 1894
- 3** **Shad Thames**  
Docklands street from years gone by, with warehouses either side and crossed by latticed walkways, used for transferring goods
- 4** **The Harpy Houseboat**  
Formerly HMS Harpy, she was the world's first Customs & Excise office
- 5** **Thames Tideway Sewer**  
This new 25km 'super sewer' will keep London clean for the next century
- 6** **The Angel pub**  
Grade II listed pub built in the 1830s. Local legend has it that Judge Jeffreys (the "hanging judge") used to come here to watch men die at Execution Dock
- 7** **Wapping**  
Home to Execution Dock, where Captain Kidd was hanged in 1701 for piracy, and famous pubs such as the Captain Kidd, Prospect of Whitby and The Grapes
- 8** **Thames Tunnel Mill**  
Grade II-listed mid-19th mill building and one of the earliest warehouse conversions
- 9** **Mayflower pub**  
End of the walk
